Luke 24:13-35


L A reading from Luke, chapter 24.

¹³That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. ¹⁶But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷And he said to them. "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" ¹⁹And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. ²¹But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. ²²Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, ²³and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. ²⁴Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." ²⁵And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! ²⁶Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?"²⁷And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

²⁸So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, ²⁹but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. ³¹And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. ³²They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" ³³And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, ³⁴saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" ³⁵Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

TITLE OF THE SERMON:

"Burning Hearts"

TEXT: Luke 24:13-35 DATE: April 23, 2023 LITURGICAL DAY: The Third Sunday of Easter

THEME: The Holy Spirit kindles the fire of faith in hearts through the word of God.

- I. The Holy Spirit opens all of Scripture and all Scripture testifies of Jesus Christ.
- II. Jesus, by His Spirit, opens the Scriptures and creates faith in the hearts of His disciples.
- III. Jesus makes Himself known to us in the breaking of the bread, Holy Communion.

CONCLUSION: Our hearts burn within us today, not with passion, but because of faith in The Passion, the death and resurrection of Jesus for the forgiveness of our sins spoken of in all Scripture. As we sang in the hymn last week, "Walking the way, Christ in the center Telling the story to open our eyes; Breaking our bread, Giving us glory: Jesus our blessing, our constant surprise. Jesus is risen and we shall arise: Give God the glory! Alleluia!" (*Alleluia! Jesus is Risen, LSB 474*) For, Christ is risen! (**He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**) In the Name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.
