
## The Book of Proverbs

"Wisdom and the Fear of the Lord: Proverbs as a Book on Faith" Week 19: Proverbs 28-29, "Advice for Kings"

I. Proverbs 27:1-11, "Better Is a Poor Man Who Walks in Integrity"
1. Verse 1 introduces this section and sets its tone. Whether rich or poor, what do the righteous have their confidence in?
2. How do those who have rejected "the law," or God's teaching in general, treat those who are evil? (v. 4) What do they not understand? (v. 5)
3. Verse 8 echoes an Old Testament law against "usury," or gathering interest on loans. (For more information, read Ex 22:25; Lev 25:35-37; Deut 23:19-20; Ezk 22:12.) What are God's reasons or his general principles for condemning usury?
4. What is the warning regarding wealth and wisdom? Is wealth an automatic indicator of wisdom?

6. Who bestows the favor in verse 23?
7. How should we guard against our own mind? Where does true wisdom come from?
