We become exhausted, that is, the breath of life seeps away. He assures us of our value to the Lord who spent His blood to make us safe and whole. He assures us of the future the Lord's resurrection has shaped for us. He gives us assur-

Healing Spaces – Dakota Boys C+11. Tools for Oaks Indian and Girls Ranch, Minot, ND

Mission Grant #13 \$5000



The Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch in Minot, North Dakota, works with the physically and emotionally abused children to show them merciful care and the healing power of the Gospel message. During their stay at the ranch, they are able to visualize the world differently, experience the love of God through those caring for them and look to their future with hope.

One of the key components of their program is attending worship services at the Kruse Memorial Chapel. Renovations were sorely needed as the structure was almost 50 years old. With donations from various LWML districts, upgrades included revamping chapel décor, upgrading audio equipment and restroom remodeling. The Oklahoma District grant was used specifically for the restroom upgrades.

Once the renovations were completed, it was noted that chapel attendance increased as well as general use of the facilities. Increased use of the chapel/ gym has built confidence to the residents as they utilize the instruments, sound equipment, recreational equipment, and, of course, the restrooms. One

resident, who struggled in uncomfortable and stressful environments, now utilizes the facilities daily and has become a regular reader in the chapel services.
